


Toolkit objectives

- **Provide practical guidance:** Demonstrate how to integrate, measure, monitor, verify and validate social and environmental safeguards and SDG impacts in projects and programmes.

Target audience

- Supply-side actors: The Toolkit helps governments, project developers, companies, NGOs, Indigenous Peoples, local communities and other rights holders to design, implement and scale carbon market activities that deliver real, additional and equitable climate outcomes.
- > **Demand-side actors:** The Toolkit guides investors, corporates, governments and individuals in procuring high-integrity credits and ensuring their investment drives meaningful, long-term benefits for both climate and communities.
- > Institutions that set and uphold market integrity: The Toolkit provides practical guidance to help institutions strengthen safeguards, assess project quality, and promote transparency and trust in the marketplace. 

Carbon markets 101

How compliance and voluntary carbon markets work, who the key players are, and how diverse project types—from forestry to clean energy—generate credible emission reductions. Includes in-depth training for countries on operationalizing Article 6.2.

Consultation and consent

Building trust and legitimacy through meaningful engagement with Indigenous Peoples, local communities and other stakeholders, applying the principles of Free, Prior and Informed Consent (FPIC).

Gender equality and women's empowerment

Strategies to enhance women's participation and leadership across all stages of carbon market project and programme design and implementation.







Grievance redress mechanisms

How to design transparent, trusted and accessible systems that prevent and resolve disputes, strengthen accountability, and promote continuous dialogue.

Equitable benefit sharing

How to design and implement fair and inclusive benefit sharing mechanisms to ensure carbon finance supports lasting social and economic gains for communities.

Social and environmental safeguards

Tools to identify, assess, manage, monitor and report social and environmental risks and align with international human rights and best practice standards.

Sustainable development impacts

How carbon projects and programmes can advance the Sustainable Development Goals by enhancing biodiversity, resilience and community well-being.



Intended outcomes for participants

- **Informed engagement** Gain the knowledge and capacity to participate effectively in carbon markets.
- **Opportunities & risks** Understand key opportunities and challenges shaping market participation.
- Clear next steps Leave with a practical roadmap for continued engagement and action.
- **New connections** When used in a group setting, build valuable relationships and partnerships across the carbon market ecosystem.
- **Resource access** Learn how to tap into tools and networks that support informed decision-making.
- **Strategic dialogue** Be equipped to drive forward-looking discussions on your role and impact in carbon markets.

Realizing social integrity

The Toolkit also supports actors to achieve longer-term social integrity objectives.

- **Project developers:** Apply rigorous procedures to identify, assess, manage, monitor and report potential social and environmental impacts, including those affecting Indigenous Peoples' rights.
- Host countries: Establish legal and policy frameworks for Article 6 and voluntary carbon markets to ensure all carbon market activities align with strong safeguards and international obligations.


- Indigenous Peoples, local communities, women and other rights holders: Actively engage in the design, implementation, monitoring and governance of carbon market activities to ensure respect for their rights, equitable benefit sharing, and participation in decision-making.
- Carbon credit rating agencies: Integrate safeguards and SDG impact into rating systems, offering a more complete evaluation of credit quality and project performance.
- **Validation and verification bodies:** Strengthen methodologies and staff capacity to conduct not only technical assessments but also social audits, verifying compliance with safeguards and human rights obligations.
- **Buyers:** Drive change by demanding high-integrity credits and paying a fair price for them.



How should the Toolkit be used?

The Toolkit is flexible, user-friendly and multilingual. It will first be made available in English, and then starting in 2026, in French, Portuguese and Spanish. It includes presentations, webinars, FAQs, guidance notes, comparative assessments, blogs, videos, photo stories and case studies, to support diverse learning styles.

Users can learn at their own pace, explore specific topics, or use the materials for group learning in workshop and training settings. While global in scope, materials will be tailored to national, regional and community contexts through close collaboration with local partners, ensuring practical, real-world impact.
